How can he now say, "I have come down from heaven"?' <sup>43</sup> Jesus answered them, 'Do not complain among yourselves. <sup>44</sup> No one can come to me unless drawn by the Father who sent me; and I will raise that person up on the last day. <sup>45</sup> It is written in the prophets, "And they shall all be taught by God." ## A Reflection for the day Reflection from John Webb

As we look forward to the end of the Covid restrictions it's interesting to consider what the 'new normal' will look like – will we simply slip back into our old ways or can we grasp it as an opportunity to learn the lessons of the lockdown.

There is no doubt that we develop habits and ways of doing things over time without really considering why. The lockdown has broken some of these habits and it's well worth considering if we should go back to our old ways or is there a better way? One of the habits I am pleased to have been jerked out of has been 'The Archers'. For years we listened to it regularly. However, the format changed with the lockdown and we didn't like it so we gave up and we certainly won't start again.

Another change we have been forced to make is over worship which we have been unable to attend for nearly two years. My parents took me to church every Sunday from a very early age and I have continued every week for over eighty years. So it was a deep shock when I was unable to go and I had to ask myself if it was just another unconsidered habit or is it something fundamental?' I very quickly came to the conclusion that it is fundamentally important because it is an opportunity to concentrate on the real meaning and purpose of life.

It also raises the question of how we worship which was when I realised that modern worship is radically different from when I first went to church all those years ago. I also realised that, as a priest and minister, I have been partly responsible for that change. When my parents first took me to church it was very serious, dignified and rather distant. The only orders of service were from the Book of Common Prayer with the readings from the King James Bible. It was beautifully done, but it seemed rather archaic and detached from everyday life. It was almost as if we were transported into another world. The normal service was Morning Prayer. Holy Communion was usually early in the day and was very solemn and serious. I was told at my confirmation that the sacrament was very special and that should only be received after careful self-examination and preparation. It was also expected to be after a time of fasting which was why it was usually early in the day before breakfast.

By the time I went to Theological College there was a growing move towards liturgical reform. It was felt that the services were not very user friendly, the language was archaic and the communion had become elitist. There was a lot of resistance to change, but over the years gradual incremental changes have taken place. Services in contemporary language, new bible translations, sermons shortened and simplified, organs supplemented by pianos and guitars, black cassocks replaced by white albs. Most significantly the Family Communion replaced Morning Prayer as the main service in most churches. The cumulative effect of these changes have resulted in a radical change in the whole concept of worship so I have used the lock down to

consider my reaction. This has been helped by St John's words of Jesus 'I am the Bread of life' which have been the Gospel readings for last Sunday, this Sunday and next Sunday.

My feeling is that the pendulum has swung too far. Yes, worship was in need of reform, but I just wonder if we have gone too far. Have we lost something of the wonder and mystery of the awesome reality that the broken bread and poured out wine of the Eucharist are the broken body and poured out blood of Christ on the cross? So my 'new normal' will be to come back to the communion with an added sense of the sacred mystery of the gift of the Eucharist. I hope that you too will come back with an added understanding of what we have missed and a new appreciation of Jesus as The Bread of Life on which we are fed for the daily journey of faith.

#### The Creed
