Preparation

Our Confession

Silence is kept.

All: As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. Amen.

Scripture Reading Acts 12.1-11

About that time King Herod laid violent hands upon some who belonged to the church. ² He had James, the brother of John, killed with the sword. ³ After he saw that it pleased the Jews, he proceeded to arrest Peter also. (This was during the festival of Unleavened Bread.) ⁴ When he had seized him, he put him in prison and handed him over to four squads of soldiers to guard him, intending to bring him out to the people after the Passover. ⁵ While Peter was kept in prison, the church prayed fervently to God for him.

⁶ The very night before Herod was going to bring him out, Peter, bound with two chains, was sleeping between two soldiers, while guards in front of the door were keeping watch over the prison. ⁷ Suddenly an angel of the Lord appeared and a light shone in the cell. He tapped Peter on the side and woke him, saying, 'Get up quickly.' And the chains fell off his wrists. ⁸ The angel said to him, 'Fasten your belt and put on your sandals.' He did so. Then he said to him, 'Wrap your cloak around you and follow me.' ⁹ Peter went out and followed him; he did not realize that what was happening with the angel's help was real; he thought he was seeing a vision. ¹⁰ After they had passed the first and the second guard, they came before the iron gate leading into the city. It opened for them of its own accord, and they went outside and walked along a lane, when suddenly the angel left him. ¹¹ Then Peter came to himself and said, 'Now I am sure that the Lord has sent his angel and rescued me from the hands of Herod and from all that the Jewish people were expecting.'

The Gospel Matthew 16.13-19

Alleluia, alleluia. I do not call you servants but friends, because I have made known to you everything that I have heard from my Father.

Now when Jesus came into the district of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, 'Who do people say that the Son of Man is?' ¹⁴ And they said, 'Some say John the Baptist, but others Elijah, and still others Jeremiah or one of the prophets.' ¹⁵ He said to them, 'But who do you say that I am?' ¹⁶ Simon Peter answered, 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God.' ¹⁷ And Jesus answered him, 'Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah! For flesh and blood has not revealed this to you, but my Father in heaven. ¹⁸ And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not prevail against it. ¹⁹ I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven, and whatever you bind on earth will be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be loosed in heaven.'

A Reflection for the day Revd John Webb writes:

We know more about Peter than any of the other apostles but he's not really the type of person we would expect to be the one nearest to Jesus and the leader of the early church. He comes over as volatile, impetuous, and even unreliable. Making grand promises and then failing to deliver. He tried to walk on water and failed. He was at the transfiguration and didn't know what to do. In our reading to-day he is the first to acknowledge Jesus as the promised Messiah, but in the next verse Jesus reprimands him for failing to understand the implications of what he has just said. He failed to stay awake at Gethsemane. And most famously, at the Last Supper he makes a bold claim to be faithful to Jesus whatever the price only to deny Him a few hours later when challenged by a mere servant girl! Above all he comes over as a person who keeps on making mistakes and having to apologise. And yet Jesus loved him and he became the leader of the early church and died a martyr.

We all make mistakes but accepting that we are wrong is exceedingly difficult. There seems to be a stubborn streak in many of us which means that we stick to our opinions even when it becomes clear we are mistaken. Politicians are for ever being accused of making a U-turn which is regarded a sign of failure and weakness. A Prime Minister once famously said, 'you change if you want to – the lady's not for turning.' To change our mind is seen as weakness and vacillation. I suggest that, on the contrary, it can be a strength. The essence of Jesus message is that we need to change and Peter shows us that we can.

When I first left school, I worked in an office the City of London. At that time women only worked as typists, bookkeepers, telephonists, tea-ladies, and cleaners. Black people were train guards, bus conductors and road sweepers. It was assumed that real work and significant decisions could only be made by white well-educated males. And, at the weekend most people looked forward to and enjoyed The Black and White Minstrel Show on tiny grainy televisions without realising how offensive that was to black people! It has been interesting to see a dramatic change on both gender and racial inequality during my lifetime and I'm pleased. But there is still some way to go.

I wonder what other injustices, we now take for granted, will be corrected by the present generation. What about poverty, climate change and war?

All this was well summed up by John Newman (now Saint) when he wrote that 'to live is to change and to be perfect is to change often'. Peter may not have been perfect, but he was certainly prepared to change when necessary. Can we follow his example?

The Creed

All: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.
