We have lived for this world alone, and doubted our home in heaven. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

Be still for a moment in confession and in receiving God's Grace in Christ

All: May Almighty God, who in Jesus Christ has given us a kingdom that cannot be destroyed, forgive us our sins, open our eyes to God's truth, strengthen us to do God's will and give us the joy of his kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Risen Lord. **Amen.**

# The Psalmody Psalm 50.7-15

Hear, O my people, and I will speak: 'I will testify against you, O Israel; for I am God, your God.

'I will not reprove you for your sacrifices, for your burnt offerings are always before me.

'I will take no bull out of your house, nor he-goat out of your folds,

'For all the beasts of the forest are mine, the cattle upon a thousand hills.

For the promise that he would inherit the world did not come to Abraham or to his descendants through the law

### Scripture Reading Romans 4.13-25

but through the righteousness of faith. <sup>14</sup> If it is the adherents of the law who are to be the heirs, faith is null and the promise is void. <sup>15</sup> For the law brings wrath; but where there is no law, neither is there violation. <sup>16</sup> For this reason it depends on faith, in order that the promise may rest on grace and be guaranteed to all his descendants, not only to the adherents of the law but also to those who share the faith of Abraham (for he is the father of all of us, <sup>17</sup> as it is written, 'I have made you the father of many nations')—in the presence of the God in whom he believed, who gives life to the dead and calls into existence the things that do not exist. <sup>18</sup> Hoping against hope, he believed that he would become 'the father of many nations', according to what was said, 'So numerous shall your descendants be.' <sup>19</sup> He did not weaken in faith when he considered his own body, which was already as good as dead (for he was about a hundred years old), or when he considered the barrenness of Sarah's womb. <sup>20</sup> No distrust made him waver concerning the promise of God, but he grew strong in his faith as he gave glory to God, <sup>21</sup> being fully convinced that God was able to do what he had promised. <sup>22</sup> Therefore his faith 'was reckoned to him as righteousness.' <sup>23</sup> Now the words, 'it was reckoned to him', were written not for his sake alone, <sup>24</sup> but for ours also. It will be reckoned to us who believe in him who raised Jesus our Lord from the dead, <sup>25</sup> who was handed over to death for our trespasses and was raised for

# The Gospel Matthew 9.9-13 and 18-26

As Jesus was walking along, he saw a man called Matthew sitting at the tax booth; and he said to him, 'Follow me.' And he got up and followed him.

<sup>10</sup> And as he sat at dinner in the house, many tax-collectors and sinners came and were sitting with him and his disciples. <sup>11</sup> When the Pharisees saw this, they said to his disciples, 'Why does your teacher eat with tax-collectors and sinners?' <sup>12</sup> But when he heard this, he said, 'Those who are well have no need of a physician, but those who are sick. <sup>13</sup> Go and learn what this means, "I desire mercy, not sacrifice." For I have come to call not the righteous but sinners.'

While he was saying these things to them, suddenly a leader of the synagogue came in and knelt before him, saying, 'My daughter has just died; but come and lay your hand on her, and she will live.' <sup>19</sup> And Jesus got up and followed him, with his disciples. <sup>20</sup> Then suddenly a woman who had been suffering from haemorrhages for twelve years came up behind him and touched the fringe of his cloak, <sup>21</sup> for she said to herself, 'If I only touch his cloak, I will be made well.' <sup>22</sup> Jesus turned, and seeing her he said, 'Take heart, daughter; your faith has made you well.' And instantly the woman was made well. <sup>23</sup> When Jesus came to the leader's house and saw the flute-players and the crowd making a commotion, <sup>24</sup> he said, 'Go away; for the girl is not dead but sleeping.' And they laughed at him. <sup>25</sup> But when the crowd had been put outside, he went in and took her by the hand, and the girl got up. <sup>26</sup> And the report of this spread throughout that district. at the end of the reading we say:

# A Reflection for the day

I do worry sometimes if there are not enough 'sinners and tax collectors' in our churches. When I say 'sinners and tax collectors' I am sure you instantly know who I am talking of, the folks we consider outside our sensibilities, those who live in the wrong road, those who do the jobs beneath the rest of us, those your mum would say to keep away from because they have fleas and are dirty. If we take note of Matthew's gospel today it seems these folks are the very people Jesus makes a be-line for and sits down and eats with.

Jesus act of sitting down is not just having a cuppa and a biscuit with folks. Sitting and eating in the manner suggested in Matthew is a central part of Judaism, which points to being accepted, of hospitality being both given and received. In his actions Jesus both says these folks are welcomed as God's people, as he receives their hospitality and in his call to 'come follow after me'.

It is hardly surprising that those with religious sensibilities are vexed by Jesus' actions; they are scandalous! No Rabbi of any good calling from God, no holy God for that matter would stoop to this level, would come sit with sinners and tax collectors! And more so, no God would accept the touch and offer healing, as Jesus does, to a woman 'unclean' by her condition. And more, no Rabbi would go to the dead, to touch a body and pray for God's grace as Jesus jumps up to do. This is all completely scandalous behaviour.

'But', says Paul 'look', this is actually our God's way of things. Being righteous before God has never been about 'keeping the letter of the law'. It has, ever since God's call to Abraham and Sarah, been simply a matter of faith. And more, it is not a matter for our judgement who is acceptable in the faith; this is for God alone, in Christ! God in Christ accounts righteousness to any and all who have faith in him; this is truly scandalous – God would welcome and call sinners and tax collectors! But then the healthy do not need a doctor.

In many churches today we can find those who tell us, and most likely also God, who can and cannot be accepted and receive the call to 'come follow after me'. Matthew, the Tax-collector was despised, yet Jesus extends God's welcome and his call to follow after, to be his disciple. Do we, as a church, or even individually outwardly - or just with a vibe - tell folks, tell God maybe, who can be accepted by God and called to follow after? Do we outwardly or just through a vibe make it known who would fit our worshipping community, or do we welcome as God welcomes? Are we open to following after Jesus and seeking out the 'sinners and tax collectors' offering them welcome and receiving their hospitality?
