An Acclamation

Our Confession

Let us come to the light of Christ, confessing our sins in penitence and faith.

All: Jesus Christ, risen Master and triumphant Lord, we come to you in sorrow for our sins, and confess to you our weakness and unbelief.

We have lived by our own strength, and not by the power of your resurrection. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

We have lived by the light of our own eyes, as faithless and not believing. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

We have lived for this world alone, and doubted our home in heaven. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

Be still for a moment in confession and in receiving God's Grace in Christ

All: May Almighty God, who in Jesus Christ has given us a kingdom that cannot be destroyed, forgive us our sins, open our eyes to God's truth, strengthen us to do God's will and give us the joy of his kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Risen Lord. **Amen.**

The opening prayer

All: The night has passed, and the day lies open before us; let us pray with one heart and mind.

Silence is kept.

All: As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. Amen.

The Psalmody Psalm 92.1-4 and 12 to 14

It is a good thing to give thanks to the Lord and to sing praises to your name, O Most High;

To tell of your love early in the morning and of your faithfulness in the night-time,

Upon the ten-stringed instrument, upon the harp, and to the melody of the lyre.

For you, Lord, have made me glad by your acts, and I sing aloud at the works of your hands.

The righteous shall flourish like a palm tree, and shall spread abroad like a cedar of Lebanon.

Scripture Reading Ezekiel 17.22 to end

Thus says the Lord God: I myself will take a sprig from the lofty top of a cedar; I will set it out.

I will break off a tender one from the topmost of its young twigs; I myself will plant it on a high and lofty mountain.

²³ On the mountain height of Israel I will plant it, in order that it may produce boughs and bear fruit, and become a noble cedar. Under it every kind of bird will live; in the shade of its branches will nest winged creatures of every kind.

²⁴ All the trees of the field shall know that I am the Lord. I bring low the high tree, I make high the low tree; I dry up the green tree and make the dry tree flourish.

I the Lord have spoken; I will accomplish it.

At the end of the reading we say:

The Gospel Mark 4.26-34

He also said, 'The kingdom of God is as if someone would scatter seed on the ground, ²⁷ and would sleep and rise night and day, and the seed would sprout and grow, he does not know how. ²⁸ The earth produces of itself, first the stalk, then the head, then the full grain in the head. ²⁹ But when the grain is ripe, at once he goes in with his sickle, because the harvest has come.'

³⁰ He also said, 'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? ³¹ It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth; ³² yet when it is

sown it grows up and becomes the greatest of all shrubs, and puts forth large branches, so that the birds of the air can make nests in its shade.'

³³ With many such parables he spoke the word to them, as they were able to hear it; ³⁴ he did not speak to them except in parables, but he explained everything in private to his disciples. at the end of the reading we sav:

All: This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

A Reflection for the day

What do you look for in a King, and what type of kingdom are the to be king of? This had been a question for Israel over many centuries.

Almost from the first time the people asked for a King their concept and ideas had been at odds with God's idea. Kings were fine, tall, commanding, wise, dedicated to God and ever able to deliver the nation from their enemies. They were strong and true like the great cedars of Lebanon; standing tall for everyone to admire, protective to all who would seek their shelter.

When the people looked to God for a king their hopes would have been for a tall cedar, a pin-up monarch able to outshine any other nation's king on the regal catwalk. But God gave them David – the least, the insignificant, some might have said the runt of the litter from the smallest tribe of the nation. What!

But David was God's preferred leader, humble and devoted to trying to do the right thing in God's eyes. Centuries later David was the still God's architype. It would not be through a Caesar like leader God would deliver the nation, but someone descending from King David, someone home grown after God's own heart; how else could they direct the rule of God? How else would they bring to fruition what is at the heart of God's kingdom rule—love, justice, mercy grace and peace?

Even in Jesus day the people seem to be looking for the wrong kingdom, for a leader not of God's own heart to deliver them from what oppressed them. Jesus' parables are filled with irony – whilst the people look for a majestic, Lebanese cedar like king to deliver them and provide shelter from the heat of the day, such shelter in Israel is already to be seen all around in the ugly and sprawling bush, grown from the smallest and most insignificant of seeds, the mustard bush. Jesus is challenging his people to open their eyes and look with God's perspective and see his provision, already made.

Outward appearances have never been God's preferences when it comes to providing leadership that is life affirming for his people. The challenge for God's people has always been to see the world about them, the needs and the solutions for those needs, with the eyes of God, with hearts after God's own. God's priorities are so often at odds with those of a vain world. Christ demonstrates God's perspective; love, peace, grace, mercy and justice for the world.

At any time of general election, the 'art of spin' goes into full overdrive seeking to remind us of the type of leadership we want, and more so the type of nation we should be. When we look to the candidates before us, with whose eyes do we look? When we hear manifestos are we listening out for justice, mercy, grace, peace and love in them. At this time are we praying more than ever 'your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven' and do we really mean it?
