An Acclamation

Preparation

All: This is the day that the Lord has made.

Our Confession

All: May Almighty God, who in Jesus Christ has given us a kingdom that cannot be destroyed, forgive us our sins, open our eyes to God's truth, strengthen us to do God's will and give us the joy of his kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Risen Lord. **Amen.**

The opening prayer

All: The night has passed, and the day lies open before us; let us pray with one heart and mind.

Silence is kept.

All: As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. Amen.

Lord, who may dwell in your tabernacle?

Scripture Reading Deuteronomy 4.1-2 and 6-9

So now, Israel, give heed to the statutes and ordinances that I am teaching you to observe, so that you may live to enter and occupy the land that the Lord, the God of your ancestors, is giving you. ² You must neither add anything to what I command you nor take away anything from it, but keep the commandments of the Lord your God with which I am charging you.

⁶ You must observe them diligently, for this will show your wisdom and discernment to the peoples, who, when they hear all these statutes, will say, 'Surely this great nation is a wise and discerning people!' ⁷ For what other great nation has a god so near to it as the Lord our God is whenever we call to him? ⁸ And what other great nation has statutes and ordinances as just as this entire law that I am setting before you today?

⁹ But take care and watch yourselves closely, so as neither to forget the things that your eyes have seen nor to let them slip from your mind all the days of your life; make them known to your children and your children's children.

The Gospel Mark 7.1-8, 14,15 and 21-23

Now when the Pharisees and some of the scribes who had come from Jerusalem gathered around him, ² they noticed that some of his disciples were eating with defiled hands, that is, without washing them. ³ (For the Pharisees, and all the Jews, do not eat unless they thoroughly wash their hands, thus observing the tradition of the elders; ⁴ and they do not eat anything from the market unless they wash it; and there are also many other traditions that they observe, the washing of cups, pots, and bronze kettles.) ⁵ So the Pharisees and the scribes asked him, 'Why do your disciples not live according to the tradition of the elders, but eat with defiled hands?' ⁶ He said to them, 'Isaiah prophesied rightly about you hypocrites, as it is written,

"This people honours me with their lips, but their hearts are far from me; ⁷ in vain do they worship me, teaching human precepts as doctrines."

¹⁴ Then he called the crowd again and said to them, 'Listen to me, all of you, and understand: ¹⁵ there is nothing outside a person that by going in can defile, but the things that come out are what defile.'

²¹ For it is from within, from the human heart, that evil intentions come: fornication, theft, murder, ²² adultery, avarice, wickedness, deceit, licentiousness, envy, slander, pride, folly. ²³ All these evil things come from within, and they defile a person.'

A Reflection for the day

Much has been featured in the news this week about shop lifting which, it seems has become endemic and almost accepted as a social norm. I suspect for most of us it is something we do not directly see or think about, however it impacts all of us. It impacts us through the higher prices shops charge to cover the cost of their losses, but I wonder if it also impacts us as part of the society we live within. Punishment is called for, but the legal system has no time and little recourse to use, it would seem, to prevent these crimes.

Galilee in Jesus time, was known as 'Galilee of the gentiles'. The Jews who lived there were in a minority and had two main options: to live like the gentiles, or to do all they could to be 'good Jews', to be faithful in their calling to live by the 'ordinances and statutes' received from God (see our reading from Deuteronomy above).

Within such a context it is easy to see why the Pharisees have concerns about Jesus, and how his disciples are acting; to some they must have looked as those who had given up on the 'ordinances and statutes' of God. But the people were saying Jesus was from God, possibly the Messiah, how could this be so when he is not calling all to have a strict adherence to the Law, and even seems open to Gentiles?

Many have taken the conversations Jesus held with the Pharisees as a condemnation by God of all they represented, including the Law, however I wonder if that is too simplistic a conclusion! Jesus does not come to do away with the Law but to fulfil it, so he can't be saying to the Pharisees you have to abandon everything you have learnt and be, well lawless just like one of the Gentiles. The Law has had a purpose through the ages, to enable folks to live out their faith. However, Jesus announces a new age of God, what might be the place of the law in that new time of God?

⁸ You abandon the commandment of God and hold to human tradition.'

All the calling for arrests and sentencing of shoplifters will arguably do very little to stop the epidemic. In the end society has to say this is not how we live, this is not who we are; it has to be unacceptable and folks of all ages, children especially have to learn you do not do these things. Imposition of laws and regulation on people is never the answer, a change of heart is what is required.

This is the core of any critique Jesus offers to the Pharisees! It isn't that adherence to the ways of God, the ordinances, the statues, the laws, is a bad thing. What is necessary is a change of heart because, as Jesus says, it is from the heart, from the core 'being' of a person that bad things or good things come. Jesus is not come to do away with the Law but to enable it to be fulfilled in every person's life; be they Jew or Gentile – this is indeed a new age of God!

Conversations elsewhere in the gospels about the Law see Jesus asked what is the most important of all the Laws. You get the sense that the question is nonsense in Jesus' eyes; he replies that what matters is the heart, mind, and soul of the adherent. And more, how they let what is in their heart, mind and soul to be animated in their lives – it is about the application of everything. It is then about letting our hearts animate our entire being with all our strength, to love both ourselves (God loves each of us, so we should love ourselves) and our neighbour.

Jesus does not condemn the Pharisees, he hopes for their hearts, for them to be free of a burdensome yoke under the Law; and he likewise hopes this will be so for each of us. I wonder if we will again today take his yoke!

The Creed

All: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven,

he is seated at the right hand of the Father,

and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church,

the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins,
