

An Acclamation for the Season

All: Hosanna to the Son of David, the King of Israel. Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

Preparation

All: This is the day that the Lord has made.

Let us rejoice and be glad in it.

Through the brokenness of Christ, we become one body

as one body we now gather in the name of Christ to offer our praise and thanksgiving, to receive God's holy word, to pray for the needs of the world,

and to seek the forgiveness of our sins, that by the power of the Holy Spirit we may give ourselves to the service of God.

Our Confession

Let us come to the light of Christ, confessing our sins in penitence and faith.

All: Jesus Christ, risen Master and triumphant Lord, we come to you in sorrow for our sins, and confess to you our weakness and unbelief.

We have lived by our own strength, and not by the power of your resurrection. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

We have lived by the light of our own eyes, as faithless and not believing. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

We have lived for this world alone, and doubted our home in heaven. In your mercy, forgive us, hear us and help us.

Be still for a moment in confession and in receiving God's Grace in Christ

All: May Almighty God, who in Jesus Christ has given us a kingdom that cannot be destroyed, forgive us our sins, open our eyes to God's truth, strengthen us to do God's will and give us the joy of his kingdom, through Jesus Christ our Risen Lord. **Amen.**

The opening prayer

All: The night has passed, and the day lies open before us; let us pray with one heart and mind.

Silence is kept.

All: As we rejoice in the gift of this new day, so may the light of your presence, O God, set our hearts on fire with love for you; now and for ever. Amen.

The Psalmody Psalm 118.1-2 and 19-29 We say the psalm aloud

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his mercy endures for ever.

Let Israel now proclaim, 'His mercy endures for ever.'

Open to me the gates of righteousness, that I may enter and give thanks to the Lord.

This is the gate of the Lord; the righteous shall enter through it.

I will give thanks to you, for you have answered me and have become my salvation.

The stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone.

This is the Lord's doing, and it is marvellous in our eyes.

This is the day that the Lord has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it.

Come, O Lord, and save us we pray. Come, Lord, send us now prosperity.

Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord; we bless you from the house of the Lord.

The Lord is God; he has given us light; link the pilgrims with cords right to the horns of the altar.

You are my God and I will thank you; you are my God and I will exalt you.

O give thanks to the Lord, for he is good; his mercy endures for ever.

as it was in the beginning, is now and ever shall be, world without end. Amen

All: Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth.

Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory.

Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer.

The Gospel Luke 19.28-40

²⁸ After he had said this, he went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

²⁹ When he had come near Bethphage and Bethany, at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of the disciples, ³⁰ saying, 'Go into the village ahead of you, and as you enter it you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden. Untie it and bring it here. ³¹ If anyone asks you, "Why are you untying it?" just say this: "The Lord needs it." ³² So those who were sent departed and found it as he had told them. ³³ As they were untying the colt, its owners asked them, 'Why are you untying the colt?' ³⁴ They said, 'The Lord needs it.' ³⁵ Then they brought it to Jesus; and after throwing their cloaks on the colt, they set Jesus on it. ³⁶ As he rode along, people kept spreading their cloaks on the road. ³⁷ As he was now approaching the path down from the Mount of

Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to praise God joyfully with a loud voice for all the deeds of power that they had seen, ³⁸ saying,

'Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord!

Peace in heaven, and glory in the highest heaven!'

³⁹ Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, 'Teacher, order your disciples to stop.' ⁴⁰ He answered, 'I tell you, if these were silent, the stones would shout out.'

at the end of the reading we say:

All: This is the word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

A Reflection for the day

'Hosanna, Hosanna', the people cried; but there is more to see here than the crowds, for all of creation joins together in celebrating God's Messiah and his arrival in Jerusalem.

Worship is at the heart of our faith; the worship of the one God with our whole heart, mind, soul and resource. Today we see worship of God in many forms, and its rejection also!

The obvious worshippers are the crowd, predominantly the poor and the marginalized in society. If they had not followed Jesus from elsewhere to Jerusalem they are folks who were there already, some pilgrims as Passover approached, others probably residents. Whoever they are, in this moment they worship God whole heartedly. They sing and chant and make public and open announcements about the kingdom of God; whilst Luke does not include the nationalist symbol of the palm branches there is no ducking away from there being both a clash of societies and also a clash of politics here!

Look how the people worship in song, dance, and celebration, yes – and more, they spread their wealth before Jesus as an act of worship; sacrificially! The cloaks and robes would have been both their protection from the elements and often the bedding pillow if you were poor. In placing them on the road, to be trampled on, there is a statement of humility before God, there is a statement of dependence on God's providence, there is a generosity – this is not a 'what I have I give in worship' type action, it is not even a 10% tithe, this was 50% of their resource!

This is also worship with no concern for what others might think; as King David did himself. And others do have an opinion, and express it - 'tell them to be silent!', say some Pharisees in the crowd. If they were to be silent, Jesus says, the rest of creation would cry out in worship for what God was undertaking in Jesus. And what is it Jesus is undertaking? Surely, in following the will of the Father he is engaged in worship, complete worship of heart, mind soul and resource; all and everything!

We dare not forget the donkey on Palm Sunday and think on what this animal brings to the story and our reflections today. Jesus could have walked in but no king would have done that, they would have been carried or ridden in triumphantly. To do so a horse would have been used; almost certainly Pilate would have arrived on horseback, with trumpets sounding and people expected to cheer him. Jesus does not arrive as an 'over lord', he comes a s servant, in humility and riding on a donkey enables him to pint us to the heart of all worship, humble servanthood!

One other thing the donkey's presence does reveal is the offering in worship of the hidden owner who, whether there has been an agreement with Jesus or not, gifts his donkey willingly on hearing it is the 'master' who requires it. Not so much mi casa, su casa, but maybe 'all things come from you and of your own do I give to you'!

Palm Sunday welcomes us into a celebratory time of worship, with palm cross waving and hymn singing. It also, as we step into the fullness of Holy week and Easter it welcomes us to continue our Lenten journey and to reflect on the heart of our worship and how we express that in each day – heart, mind, soul and resources.

The Creed

All: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.

I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, who was conceived by the Holy Spirit, born of the Virgin Mary, suffered under Pontius Pilate,

was crucified, died, and was buried; he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose again; he ascended into heaven,

he is seated at the right hand of the Father,

and he will come to judge the living and the dead.

I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church,
